Local Diaper Banks Step Up

A 2023 National Diaper Bank Network, or NDBN, study of North Carolina found that the state had a total of 345,005 children under the age of three.

And what do most of those children wear? Diapers.

The study also found that one in two of the families surveyed were forced to make tough decisions in regard to diaper purchases.

On average, a child uses between 2,000 and 2,200 diapers a year and like most items at the store, costs have increased.

"We began a diaper bank because we started seeing families struggling with the cost of providing adequate diapering to their children," said Tara Fish, executive director of the Harnett County Partnership for Children. "When I dug deeper into the concept, I realized that there was not a single government assistance program that was helping these families."

A diaper bank is a nonprofit organization formed for the sole purpose of providing diapers to people who do not have access to diapers. Across our area, many local non-profits are helping to meet the need of parents of young children.

"There are more than a dozen organizations that host a diaper bank, many are in concert with a food bank," said Sharon Moyer, Community Engagement Administrator at Cumberland County Partnership for Children. "However, the Diaper Bank of NC provides two community-based distribution points. One is Catholic Charities and the

other is the Armed Forces YMCA, housed on Ft. Liberty, we just didn't have the room for distribution here."

"We saw a huge need as parents were requesting support in this manner," said Donna Jackson, executive director of the Sampson County Partnership for Children. "We work with low income parents and they are struggling to pay for infant needs. They would inquire about diapers for help."

The Sampson County
Partnership for Children received
an Operation Round Up grant
to help stock their bank.

"The Operation Round Up grant had a huge impact in supporting

our diaper bank," said Jackson. "The funds were helpful and did keep the program running. We order diapers online from Wal-Mart and distribute them on Monday and Wednesdays from 10 a.m. until 3 p.m."

Using word-of-mouth and signage has helped both organizations to share the need and the location of their diaper banks. Meanwhile, the North Carolina Diaper Bank's web site shares information on Cumberland County diaper banks.

"When we started with the Diaper Bank of NC, we saw a large amount of families stating they were making choices between buying diapers or paying a bill. In addition, more than 60% of active duty service members reported having difficulty paying for diapers," said Moyer. "This made Cumberland County the ideal place for the Diaper Bank of NC to start their Truckload of Hope."

All organizations are accepting donations.

"As we have grown and supported families throughout the last 5 years, we have seen the need increase from families all over the county," said Fish.

The scholarship is offered by South River EMC and covers the cost of tuition, books, boots and safety glasses. The purpose is to provide interested individuals with the ability to gain the experience and training necessary for a successful career as an electric line worker.

Upon successful completion of the program, individuals receive the Associate of Applied Science degree and will possess the necessary skills for employment in the dynamic electric utility field.

As recipients, Perez and Wilks will begin the Electric Line Construction Technology Academy Aug. 15.

Are Heating And Cooling Changes Needed?

As summer comes to an end and cooler weather starts to be considered, it's time to get your HVAC unit serviced and it might even be time to replace it.

Heating and cooling systems are the biggest contributor to electric costs each month. You can make changes to your routines and settings, but sometimes a replacement is just what is needed.

When it comes to selecting a new heating and cooling system, look at the seasonal energy efficiency ratio, or SEER, rating. The SEER measures the cooling efficiency of a system and the higher the

SEER rating, the more efficient a system is at cooling. Of course, you'll also need to consider size and perhaps even manufacturer, but by keeping efficiency in the front, you can focus on saving.

South River EMC offers rebates on air source heat pumps, central AC and geothermal heat pumps. If you're in the market for a new heating and cooling system, consider replacing it with a high efficiency system.

Last Call For Pool Pump Savings

Swim season is coming to a close and that means the pool will be closing down. It doesn't mean there isn't an opportunity to looks for savings though. As we leave the summer season, and move toward cooler temperatures, sales will be on to get rid of those summer staples and a deal on a pool pump might be the best thing to look for when shopping.

Pools typically come with a single-speed pump, one speed for all pump tasks. They tend to use more energy and water than necessary to perform tasks.

Replacing that type of pump with a variable or a two-speed pump allows you to tailor water and energy use to the tasks your pump is performing. This ultimately helps you to save energy and water by matching use to task.

If you decide to install a variable or two-speed pool pump, it might be eligible for a rebate. For details on the rebate offered by South River EMC, visit **sremc.com/pool-pumps**.

The High Efficiency Home Option

The high efficiency residential option, or HERO, home is a home-built 30 percent more efficient than standard building code.

This is due to requirements for slightly better insulation, fenestration, air sealing, equipment, and lighting packages. The certification can be achieved in one of two ways, either the performance or the prescriptive path.

The performance path is flexible, requiring an energy cost analysis (provided to you by your HERS Rater and signed-off by a Design Professional) as proof that the home you are building will have

energy costs that are less than or equal to that same home built to the HERO Code's prescriptive requirements.

Meanwhile, the prescriptive path is straightforward but inflexible: it involves complying fully with a list of specific requirements for things like insulation, high-efficiency lighting, window U-factors, whole house tightness and duct leakage testing, among other things.

By choosing either of these options, you could be eligible for a rebate for South River EMC, for details on the rebate visit **sremc.com/hero-program**.

Weatherization Helps Cut Costs

Heating and cooling costs, woah!

As we have had countless days of heat, hopefully your home has been able to stay cool. If that has grown more costly, would a little work make it better?

Air infiltration, or the loss of cooled inside air to the outside, is one cause of being uncomfortable in your home. But being proactive and caulking and weatherstripping can help. However, certain aspects of repair and upgrade can be costly.

Low-income households can take advantage of

the weatherization package for single family or manufactured homes which include air/duct sealing, improved insulation, an HVAC tune-up or replacement, and a programmable thermostat in a home with a heat pump or an electric furnace/central AC.

In having work completed by a Community Action program, you could be eligible for a rebate from the Cooperative. To qualify for the rebate, the entire package must be completed.

Being Prepared For Replacement Helps

Do you have an idea of what type of water heater you want when the time comes?

A standard electric storage water heater has an estimated lifespan of 10-15 years and when it goes out, you'll want to get it replaced as soon as possible.

Now, you could replace it with another electric storage water heater but first think about how much it costs you. A storage water heater brings water into it and then periodically heats it to your set temperature, a recommended 120

degrees, and it does that all day long. This periodic heating of water in the tank, particularly when no one is home, is not the most efficient option.

You could replace your system with a heat pump water heater, or HPWH, which pulls heat from the surrounding space and deposits it into your tank.

By using the existing heat around the unit, it is 2-3

times more efficient than a standard electric water heater. While a little more costly than a standard electric water heater, an HPWH, can help you save.

You might consider a solar water heater, which is typically roof-mounted. These units are more efficient because they use a free resource to heat your water. How efficient depends largely on solar availability and water use. When considering a solar water heater you want to explore options, including installers, types of systems and local

codes. Make sure it's the best option for you.

Looking To Replace Windows?

Traditional window materials used in houses across the United States, old single glass pane and later double-pane clear glass, can do a poor job of keeping out the cold and excessive heat.

If you are experiencing discomfort, be it too hot in the summer or too cold in the winter, your windows could be part of the problem.

Replacing windows is a significant investment, but the payback in terms of improved thermal comfort, reduced energy usage, and money saved over time makes replacement a smart choice.

Upgrading to Energy Star-qualified models can save you as much as 7-15% on energy costs, depending on the type of window being replaced. But before you embark on window replacement be sure your home has been weatherized, that your heat pump is running well and that window replacement is necessary.
